Over 30 years ago Donelle Manton was in Mazatlán on assignment to photograph children. She went to Orfanatorio Mazatlán along with a Mexican friend who lived in Mazatlán to photograph the children there. That friend was Gaudelia Cruz. When they found there was an inadequate amount of food there for the children, they went to buy groceries. That visit led Donelle to form the Tres Islas Orphanage Fund which would supply food for this orphanage and eventually 5 others over the next 30 years. In order to make this work, she needed a facilitator in Mazatlán. Gaudelia became this facilitator. Over the years she has faithfully transferred the funds for food, school supplies, hygiene and any other expenses required to maintain the health and safety of the children. Many times this has been done on short notice. She has also been invaluable in aiding in the organization of Spring Volunteer Week. She also has been our transportation when needed and participates in social events at the orphanages. (Phyllis Allen)

Refugio Mazatlán

Happy 2021 to you and your families. Things are much the same here at Refugio Mazatlán. All classes are still online. We are full to capacity with 26 boys. It has been challenging and frustrating for the kids at times, but they have adapted well and their grades are better than ever. Everyone has remained healthy. Our needs at the moment might include funding for a weekend away from Refugio for the staff and kids. The boys have been confined to the home for the best part of 10 months now, with very limited outings to the beach or the malecon. We would love to rent transportation and a large home for a change of scenery and a weekend of therapy and outdoor activities. Our other ongoing need is for assistance with school fees. Most of our boys are in high school which is not free. The costs per student vary between USD500 and USD1,600 per year.

We thank the Tres islas donors who continue to make the weekly shopping trips to Soriana possible. We are also grateful for all the Christmas generosity.

Orfanatorio Mazatlán

The girls and teenagers really liked your gifts at Christmas, Thank you very much. Girls and staff at the Institution are fine, we maintain all sanitary measures to avoid any contagion of COVID-19. This Monday, February 1, we received two more girls in voluntary shelter. (Voluntary Guard) is a program where we support families with limited resources, therefore the girls cannot continue with their school studies. We currently provide care to 20 girls and adolescents. In the Quality Education program, we have two teachers and a volunteer teacher who teaches girls mathematics through didactic materials, they are supporting girls in school learning, since it is difficult to learn through a digital platform.

Our orphanages are also blessed with donors who spend several weeks to months in Mazatlán. In addition to donating through our fund and sometimes participating in Spring Volunteer Week, they are able to spend some time at the orphanages with the children. They often also take care of needs or add enrichment with their own funds. They are much appreciated by TIOF and the individual orphanages.

I first found Tres Islas Orphanage Fund in 2007, when I was bringing my children to Mexico for Christmas. I was looking for some sort of humanitarian project and found Donelle and Tom online. I first wanted to bring Christmas and supplies to one Orphanage, but the project quickly came to include 4 Orphanages and sheets, towels, toothpaste, shampoo, etc and a personal Christmas gift for each child. We ended up having to borrow a trailer and drive to Mazatlan because we had too much to bring. That was the most wonderful experience and we were in love with 100+ kids

We continued to help and donate for the next few years and then Donelle told me about a new project to open-Floreser-a home for girls that didn't fit with the other orphans because of their experiences and for many that meant trafficking.. My daughters did a service project to raise money to purchase beds and furniture for the new Floreser home. Then, we came down and helped paint and fix up the house too, an experience my girls will never forget. Ever since I have had a soft place in my heart for these girls and Floreser.

Last year, I had the chance to do Christmas with the girls at Floreser. I spent two months in Mazatlán taking them places and buying supplies for them.

The best moment I had with the girls was on the way to see Frozen. We stopped at a light and the girls suddenly tapped me on the shoulder and handed me about 40 pesos in coins and pointed to a young woman with a baby who was begging at the light. I let the girls give the money to her. I was so impressed with our girls that they were focused on helping someone else, when they have so little themselves. I think they knew, it might easily have been them on the street and they had to help.

This year on my trip to Mazatlán, the girls were quarantined with COVID. I was allowed to go to Floreser. When I found out they had a lice problem, I was able to get them some supplies to take care of the lice.

I put it out on my Facebook, that I needed help to buy supplies and my friends and family sent money. I raised so much money that I am going to do some things at other orphanages this month too.

At the request of the girls, I was also able to have a pajama party with them. In spite of my lack of Spanish, we had a great time eating, playing games and watching a movie.

I can't believe how much some of them have grown in a year and what beautiful, fun, young women they are. Yvonne the psychologist is so great with them and they are thriving. Since my children are mostly grown I find such joy in bonding with these kids. It doesn't take much to make a big difference and show them that someone cares. You don't have to speak Spanish well or have much money either. Just a willingness to reach out and ask what is needed and care.
